6.	Explain briefly the functions of the Judge? The judge is like a umpire in a game who conducts trail impartially in an open court. He hear all the witnesses and evidence presented by all

parties concerned and decides whether the accused is guilty or innocent.

7. What are the functions of the defence lawyer?

The functions of the defence lawyer are that the Defend accused person in a court of law. He presents all evidence to rebut the prosecutors arguments and challenges all questionable assertions of fact by the prosecutor. The defence lawyer challenges procedural errors and may seek to have changes dimised because of unreliable evedence.

8. What are the rights guaranteed to the Protection under arrests in Article 22 of our Constitution?

Article 22 of the contitution guarantees to every arrested person the following fundamental rights:-

- i. Reason for being arrested.
- ii. Right of being presented before a magistrate within 24 hours of arrest.
- iii. No ill-treatment or torture during custody.
- iv. Confessions made in custody cannot be used as evidence against accused.
- v. No under 15 years boy or women cannot be caused to police stations for questioning only.
